HCC BUILDS A LEGACY OF STUDENT SUCCESS FROM THE GROUND UP



Improving campus facilities to create the ultimate student experience is a priority for Houston Community College (HCC). The 2013 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) projects support workforce readiness and improve the overall quality of HCC's learning environments. Now, many of the college's CIP projects are nearing completion and they are on budget.

Organizational Stewardship, one of the key pillars of HCC's strategic plan, contributed to the overall financial success of these projects. The 2013 CIP is 75 percent complete and within budget. These projects are also LEED Silver Certified, which stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design. It is the most widely used green building rating system in the world. Building to LEED standards saves energy and resources during the lifecycle of the facility. As a result, these projects generate significant financial savings compared to the average commercial building.

These facilities are optimized to be economically prudent to operate while being uniquely suited to support HCC's 15 Centers of Excellence. Fiscal responsibility is a driving factor through all phases of CIP development, including the repayment of the CIP debt. During the recent State of the College address, HCC Chancellor Cesar Maldonado announced that the college recently accelerated payment of \$12 million of debt ahead of schedule.

COE EXPO FEATURED AT STATE OF THE COLLEGE


Legislators, industry leaders and community partners attending the Houston Community College (HCC) 2017 State of the College discovered the depth and rigor of HCC's 15 Centers of Excellence (COE)



The stars of the COE Expo were the leading-edge equipment and resources used daily in classrooms and labs across the HCC district. Guests had the opportunity to interact with a variety of exhibits, such as the ZSpace virtual reality machine. It is in use at Coleman College, the site of HCC's Health Science COE. ZSpace engages health care students in a unique, virtual environment designed to teach problem solving skills, in addition to expanding their medical knowledge.



"We are working together to create innovative solutions that ensure our students have the tools to generate powerful results once they leave HCC and enter the workforce," said HCC Chancellor Cesar Maldonado during his State of the College address. HCC offers more than 250 associate degrees and certificate programs. Ensuring each program has the resources it needs to help students on their pathway to success is a priority for HCC.



The middle college model is designed to provide smaller student to teacher ratios in the classroom, flexible class schedules (ideal for working students whose families rely on their financial support) and individualized advising. Students have an opportunity to enroll in dual-credit classes and can then continue their educational pathways at HCC. The Middle College has a current enrollment of 93 students and has graduated 146, including the 47 who will graduate this May.

HCC ENHANCES STUDENT SERVICES WITH VETERAN'S ACADEMY

Houston Community College's (HCC) Veteran's Academy is a new and innovative, fast-track program at HCC. Veterans arrive at HCC with their own unique needs to achieve success. For these students, we focus on improving access to educational benefits, transitioning them from a military culture to a civilian and academic culture, and we are addressing a need for critical academic and developmental needs through intensive support services.

There are over 187,000 veterans in Harris County, and Texas has the second largest veteran population in the nation. HCC assists more than 3,000 veterans and their dependents. The Veteran's Academy will help them become qualified for high-demand occupations throughout Texas.

The program will reduce the time students spend earning a qualifying workforce credential by capitalizing on their prior military training, experience and education. This will reduce costs and increase opportunities for the completion of further academic experiences.

The HCC Foundation plays a critical role in providing pathways to success for our students. It provides numerous opportunities for giving and I welcome your personal and corporate involvement.




